Interpreter Marvin Budd Travels to India

On March 5th through March 19th, Marvin Budd (Interpreter), Pastor Jeff Jordan (honorary assistant coordinator to Deaf Ministries with Special Needs Ministries) and Larry Evans (Assistant to the President for Special Needs Ministries) went on a trip.

First they went to a Special Needs advisory meeting in Hosur where at least three of the 10 representatives were present for the meeting. One director was present. Representatives from North East Andhra section, where the Bobbili Deaf School is, and from Sunshine School, Kollegal Deaf School, Sunrise School, and Elim Adventist Home, gave nice reports.

While the needs are many, all reported the progress as well. Marvin reports, "The grounds there are beautiful and there is a church on campus. S. Ambrose, the Special Needs director for the Division, looked after our needs. We

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Interpreting for Revelation Speaks Peace

In January 2016, I was invited to come and give a short Deaf Ministry presentation to the Pastor's meeting at the Washington Conference office.

After I gave my brief presentation and sat down, I was joined by the conference Director of Evangelism, Tyler Long. He was very excited as he explained, "We just had a meeting yesterday with Voice of Prophecy about the upcoming Revelation Speaks

Peace meetings for next year and sign language interpreting came up. We did not know where to get an interpreter until now!

This is a providential meeting." After Tyler explained about the

Revelation Speaks Peace (RSP) meetings for 2017, I could not help but be excited too for what God was going to do for our area.

After thinking about the meetings and the speaker, Shawn Boonstra, I was concerned

about who I would team with for the meetings. I do have a team interpreter, Leslie, who has faithfully helped me over the years, but she is not yet baptized Adventist and I felt that doing a Revelation meeting would be

overwhelming to her.

I did not mention anything to Leslie because I did not want to hurt her feelings and began to pray that God would show me who I was supposed to team with.

In June 2016, at Washington

Conference Camp Meeting, I was sitting in front of our Deaf Section getting ready to interpret. I had arrived early and was enjoyed the time by myself. I felt God speaking to me as I was preparing. He said, "You need to invite Leslie to interpret with you for RSP." I am ashamed to say that I began to argue with God. "No God, you do not understand. She is not ready for this! It will be overwhelming to her."

God said again, "You need to invite Leslie to interpret for RSP." I felt that God was being absurd. There was no way I would invite Leslie to interpret! God simply did

not understand. “God, Leslie is simply not ready.”

The Deaf members began to show up and get ready for the meeting. Leslie walked in and sat down. Looking up to the front, she saw the banner advertising Revelation Speaks Peace for 2017 and then looked at me. “When are we interpreting for that?” she asked me, pointing up at the banner.

Caught off guard, I replied, “Well...I am interpreting for it next year.” After thinking for a moment, Leslie said, “I want to do it with you! We are a team.” I then launched into a long spiel on how much work it is to interpret for a Revelation meeting, how many symbols that would be interpreted, how much prep work is involved and so on.

Not deterred in the least, Leslie still was adamant about helping.

Then God’s words came back to me, “You need to invite Leslie to interpret with you for RSP.”

God knew the entire time that Leslie needed to be at RSP and I just told Him no! I then told God, “Okay, Lord. You obviously want her there.”

At the end of the meetings, the message was not only a blessing to the hearing and the Deaf, but also to Leslie. She was touched by the message and admitted to me that God spoke volumes to her through those meetings.

I look back to my talk with God that day and am ashamed that I might have been the cause of her missing out on a blessing.

Praise God that He knows us better than we know ourselves and is not only forgiving, but has a plan B in mind to allow His will to be done!

One Deaf individual came from another part of Canada to join us and had not been able to attend



church in quite some time.

In total, there were 6 Deaf individuals who gathered in Surrey

for this historical event—it was the first time in history that the Surrey SDA Church had experienced having so many Deaf in one place or an interpreter interpreting the entire service.

In addition to the excitement of having so many Deaf at church, it was also the first time that Samuel had the privilege of offering family prayer for the hearing church through the use of the interpreter.

The afternoon was filled with the blessing of food and fellowship. Please keep British Columbia area in prayer as they are trying to grow their Deaf Ministry.

The hearing that are interested in Deaf Ministry are learning American Sign Language and for some of them, it will be their third or fourth language acquired.



Marvin's comments for this part of trip were, "Most Deaf knew some ASL signs, but the group in Bobbili used the Indian fingerspelling, which was a stretch for me. We could communicate better with gestures. The Kollegal area uses ASL fingerspelling, but have several signs different signs from ours."

Lastly, the trio visited Lowry Adventist College before they flew home. Marvin writes about his visit to Lowry Adventist College, "They were very welcoming. Their campus is under reconstruction because the city is building a subway adjacent to the property and several buildings needed to be moved to accommodate. One section of the
